The dominant primal beast was strong in Buck. Under the fierce conditions of life as a sled dog, this dominance in him grew and grew. Buck used to be a domesticated canine until his owner decided to sell him off. He was too busy adjusting himself to his new life in the wild to feel at ease. He kept this primal side of him umder comtrol. Not only did he not pick fights with the other sled dogs, but he also avoided them whenever one was imminent. While living with other sled dogs, there was an obvious bitter hatred between Spitz and him. For some unknown reason, Spitz seemed to see in him a dangerous rival. After all, it had been a while since their team had welcomed a new member, and Spitz was not the most cordial canine around. While Buck shunned all offensive acts from Spitz, the latter never missed an opportunity to bare his teeth at the former. Spitz even went out of his way to bully Buck, striving constantly to start a fight, but never had Buck so much as lost any fur in all of Spitz's attempts.

One night, owners, Peter and Francis, led the dog sled team to a bleak and miserable campsite on the shore of a lake. The heavy snow, wind that cut like a white-hot knife, and darkness had forced

them to search for a suitable camping ground for the night. Under one of the sheltering rocks, Buck made himself comfortable in a warm pit on the ground. It was so snug and warm there that he was initially reluctant to leave even when Francis was distributing dinner. When Buck had finished his dinner and returned, he found Spitz occupying his spot. For the longest of time, Buck had avoided trouble with Spitz, but this was too much. The beast in him roared. He lunged at him, and this took Spitz off guard.

As the two dogs fought, a starving pack of wolves came to the campsite, lured by the smell of food. When Francis and Peter sprang into action to fend the wolves off using stout clubs, they bared their teeth menacingly and fought back. Peter found one wolf with its head buried in a nearby bin. He swung his club, and it landed heavily on the wolf's ribs. He repeated the same at the other wolves rummaging through the campsite, but the wolves took the blows in their stride. They yelped and howled under the rain of blows from both Peter and Francis but kept at what they had invaded the campsite for, determined not to relent until the very last crumb of food had been devured.

Meanwhile, the astonished sled dogs burst out of their resting spots only to see the ravaging 25 scene before their eyes. Never had Buck seen such frightful creatures - mere skeletons with bloodshot eyes - but even that was nothing compared to the terror that they were, driven by the force of hunger. Within an instance, Buck was assailed by wolves and immediately after, his head and shoulders were ripped and slashed. The din was frightful, for both canines and humans alike. Buck fought back, biting into a wolf's neck and then flinging himself upon another. Just as he was gaining 30 momentum, he felt teeth sink into his own back. Spitz had treacherously attacked him by stealth. Spitz trotted away with a triumphant look as Buck continued fighting off the wolves. Peter and Francis hurried to save their team of sled dogs, gathering and herding them towards safety. The wild wave of famished beasts retreated somewhat as Buck shook himself free. Buck drew himself away from the pack to flee away over the snow with his team. Once the team of sled dogs were a safe distance away, Francis 35 decided to run back to save what was left of the food they had while Peter took care of the sled dogs. Unfortunately, the wolves were still hanging around, reveiling in their loot. Still, it was a necessary risk to take, or their chance of surviving the trek to their destination was slim.

As Francis made a beeline for an unguarded pack of food supplies, the nearest wolf pounced on him, sinking its teeth into his calf. Francis let out a piercing scream as he struggled to kick it off, but the wolf held on stubbornly. It was incredible how hunger had driven it to this. Both Buck and Spitz, the last to leave the campsite, saw Francis struggling to get away. Exchanging a knowing look, they turned around and hastened towards the attacker of their owner. They both sprang onto the wolf, with Spitz clamping down on its neck and Buck going for its limbs. It was a fierce battle, but the wolf stood no chance against two loyal sted dogs. It released Francis from its bite and Francis scrambled to his feet, not forgetting to grab the pack of supplies. When Francis pulled back, he whistled for Spitz and Buck to follow suit. As the trio headed to join their team, something seemed to have changed between Spitz and Buck. After the incident, Spitz was no longer hostile towards Buck. He was walking alongside him, seemingly supporting his injured teammate. From that rescue, something had changed regarding his misconception of Buck.






