



Whether he was walking around in his latest designer shoes or speaking with the eloquence of a seasoned orator, Ethan's self-assured demeanour was his defining trait. He believed he was destined for greatness and made sure everyone around him knew it. 5

One sunny afternoon, Ethan's friends invited him as a special guest to join them for a charity event. The event was meant to raise funds for children in need, and while most of his friends were excited about **the cause**, Ethan was more interested in the opportunity to flaunt his new outfit and showcase his charisma. He had to be the centre of everyone's attention. His mere presence should ensure the success of the event, he believed. 10

When Ethan arrived at the event, he was greeted with admiration from his peers and noticed how his presence seemed to light up the room. This made him feel extremely satisfied. He had attained his goal at the event. However, as the day progressed, Ethan began to feel a nagging sense of disinterest. He had made a grand entrance and impressed others, however, he was losing his audience. It started to make him feel restless and helpless. 15

Unlike Ethan, capturing the attention of the crowd was a young volunteer named Amina. Her tireless efforts had been integral to the success of the event. Enthusiastically, she approached Ethan as so much had been said about his extraordinary influence by the organisers and she had hoped he would help champion the worthy cause. Amina explained to Ethan that the children they were raising funds for had written letters detailing their dreams and hopes. She had needed someone to read these letters aloud to the audience to inspire **them** to donate and hoped that Ethan would be the one. 20

Ethan, not seeing the value in the task, dismissed her request with a wave of his hand. "I'm too busy making sure everyone here remembers my name," he said, his eyes scanning the room for more opportunities to dazzle. He felt that reading those letters would diminish his self-worth. 25

Amina, though disappointed, thanked Ethan and walked away quietly, continuing her work resolutely. Eventually, the letters were not read to the audience. As the event drew to a close, it became apparent that while Ethan had captured attention, the donations were not as substantial as initially hoped. Ethan was perplexed by the lack of enthusiasm from the crowd and found himself alone in his thoughts as people began to leave. Soon, the event came to a close. 30

The next day, Ethan came across a newspaper article featuring the charity event. To his shock, the headline read: "Charity Event Falls Short: Why Personal Ego Won Over Community Spirit." The article detailed how Ethan's reluctance to help and his focus on self-promotion had overshadowed the true purpose of the event. Feeling a pang of guilt, Ethan reached out to Amina, who was still volunteering. He apologised sincerely and asked if there was anything he could do to make amends. Amina, recognising his genuine remorse, agreed to let Ethan help with the follow-up efforts for the charity. She also gave him a chance to meet some of the children who had benefited from the donations.

As Ethan spent time with the children and heard their stories, he began to understand the impact of the event and the true essence of generosity. It was not about the spotlight or the applause; it was about making a meaningful difference in the lives of others. The experience humbled him and taught him that self-worth was not measured by admiration or style, but by the positive impact one could make on the world. 40


